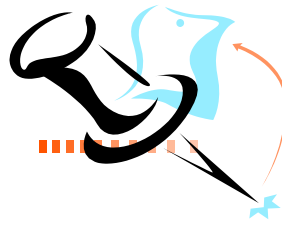

## *President's Message*

### Members —

Summer is the time of year that we relax and enjoy the great outdoors. Right? This year League members have done anything but that.

These are exciting times to be in the League. We gathered signatures for the Promote the Vote ballot proposal. We hosted seven candidate forums in preparation for the August Primary election. We held our first Board meeting of the fiscal year to discuss and plan our activities for the year. There will be many events to come, and we'll update you as the year goes along.

Mary Visos and I attended the LWVUS Convention in Chicago from June 28-July 1. As always, it was a jam-packed time, with caucuses in the morning before and in the evening after the "official" sessions took place. We'll provide more details at the next Members' meeting, which will be held on **Saturday, August 4**, at Scrambler Marie's Restaurant in Canton, starting at 10:30 a.m.

Here's just a taste of what we'll share. There were over 1,000 attendees at the Convention. It was one of the largest League National Conventions ever. There was a review of what happened in the 2 years since we last met, but much of the time was devoted to what we will do at the local, state, and national level in the next 2 years. Many speakers addressed the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the passage of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment, giving women the right to vote, and the 100<sup>th</sup> birthday of the League, which will be in 2020. One speaker made the point, though, that while these are laudable milestones, we need to consider what milestones we can anticipate after 2020.

League membership has grown in the last two years, and we need to consider what to do to retain those new members. Much focus was given to diversity, equity, and inclusion. A constant refrain was to meet people where they are. In the coming months, we'll be looking at how to implement that concept locally.

## What's So Important About Primary Elections?

Think about it. How often have you heard people talk about the "upcoming" elections, and you realize they are talking about the general elections in November? How often have you skipped voting in a primary election because you think it's not that important?

Typically, 15-20% of the population votes in a primary election. In today's world with so many gerrymandered districts, the winner of the primary for the party that's dominant in a district will glide to victory in November. The general election often amounts to no more than a rubber stamp of the choice made in the primary.

Here's the problem with that situation. If there are multiple candidates from the dominant party running in the primary, it's conceivable, and often happens, that the winning candidate gets fewer than 5% of the votes. Yet, that's the person who will go on to win in November. So, in essence, more than 95% of that community's population has had little input on who will represent them.

**The League is proposing not only that you vote on August 7, but also that you contact 5-10 people and encourage them to vote that day. Maybe even take someone to the polls with you.** Note that in the primary you'll have to choose a Democratic, Republican, or Libertarian ballot. All your votes will have to be from the party that you choose. In the general election, you won't be restricted to just one party's candidates. Make your voice heard while your preferred candidate is still in the running.

## *Women's Equality Day Luncheon*

Women's Equality Day is celebrated every year on the Saturday closest to August 26th which is the day in 1920 when the 19th Amendment was passed giving women the right to vote.. This year the luncheon will be held on Saturday, August 25th .

The League held 7 forums over 3 nights this summer in anticipation of the August 7<sup>th</sup> Primary Election. On June 11, we covered the Democratic candidates for Michigan 's 16<sup>th</sup> District State Representative and the 6<sup>th</sup> District State Senate . The Republican candidates were unopposed in the Primary. On June 26<sup>th</sup>, we partnered with the Oakland Area League and held forums for both the Republican and Democratic candidates running for the US House of Representatives – 11<sup>th</sup> District. Held at the Livonia Civic Center Library, we counted over 150 people in the audience. Though a Township usually doesn't have elections in even-numbered years, Sumpter Township voters will be electing a clerk, a treasurer and a member of their Board of Trustees this year, all to serve out partial terms. The League held a 3-part forum on July 17<sup>th</sup> for the three offices. All of our summer forums were filmed, and can now be accessed on our website.

We are grateful to all of our members who helped at our forums. Without them, we would not have been able to hold such informative events that are a needed service to our voters. ## *PROMOTE THE VOTE - ON THE WAY TO THE BALLOT!*

At least 20 members from the NW Wayne County League worked to get 756 signatures on petitions. Over 430,000 signatures were collected from every county in the state and nearly 1,000 volunteers helped in the collection. On July 9<sup>th</sup>, the Promote the Vote team turned in the signatures to the Secretary of State's office, and we are now waiting for the Board of Canvassers to give the green light so that this voting rights amendment can appear on the ballot. This common-sense proposal will ensure that every eligible voter's voice can be heard at the ballot box and that the integrity and accuracy of our elections are protected.

There will be much work to do to get this proposal passed. The leadership team of LWWMI, the ACLU, NAACP and Michigan League for Public Policy are already working on educational materials we can use to encourage voters to support this proposal.
